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MUSIC REVIEW | RUSH

Group rocks with expansive set

Get on with the fascination: A comeback and a birthday were celebrated in fine style Thursday at Polaris Amphitheater.

Rush, Canada's best rock group, put on an epic show that coincided with rock station WLVQ's (96.3 FM) 25th anniversary. The tribute was said to be the first time the power trio has plugged a station in concert. not surprising from a band whose canon includes The Spirit of Radio.

A bit of personal history Nearly 25 years ago, this scribe was buying his first stereo sys-tem with money from a high-school job. The local Radio Shack endured repeated playings of the 2112 Overture as I tested speakers. What a rush of memories it was to hear that familiar synthesizer whoosh and guitar echo again, this time at concert volume.

Going into the millennium, I

didn't think anyone would hear Rush play 2112 in 2002. The daughter and wife of drummer Neil Peart died in 1997 and 1998, and the band was shelved for a time. Yet in May, the group released a new, hard-rocking al-bum, Vapor Trails.

Thursday, three dryers tumbled what turned out to be T-shirts for lucky front-row fans as the band arrived onstage. Sure there were pyro, lasers, videos of wormholes in space and drachecked the dryers. But the best

visuals showed guitarist Alex Lifeson grinning like a kid, bass-ist/singer Geddy Lee going into semiduckwalk mode, and Peart bashing his rotating drum kit with grim determination. When

with grim determination. When Lifeson did a childlike rendition of Happy Birthday for Q-FM, even Peart cracked a smile.
Rush started with several FM staples — Tom Sauyer. Distant Early Warning. New World Man and Roll the Bones — before playing Earthshine, a standout on Vapor Trails.

Then the group switched among obscure album tracks (with help from fan polling on the Web site www.rushpetition.com), new tunes and some old favorites. What sometimes has sounded sterile on disc rocked furiously in concert.

Big Money, Limelight, Working Man, Cygnus X-1, One Little Victory, Ceiling Unlimited and By-Tor & the Snow Dog were among the gems of the 27-song, 24-hour concert.

The "thinking man's rock group" drew 9,050 mostly male, brewski-swilling air guitar and drum players. It was fascinating to see tipsy dudes swaying and boogieing as Lee shrieked, "We see the priests of the temples of are the priests of the temples of Syrinx!"


